HOUSEKEEPING IS SAFE KEEPING

Good Housekeeping is One of the First Rules of Incident Prevention

Housekeeping starts at the beginning of the shift and requires continuous effort to make certain the entire job and work area is kept clean and hazard free. Entering a clean workspace at the start of the day has many psychological benefits, it promotes safety, and demonstrates pride in our work. Poor housekeeping on the other hand, often results in unsafe conditions, less care, and injuries.

We get it, each work front is unique and has its own challenges but with some good old fashion pitching in, some effort and good choices, we can eliminate most housekeeping related obstacles.

Tools that haven't been returned to the tool cribs after use and materials that are left lying around contribute to increased congestion and bigger hazards. Disposing of scrap materials daily and removing tools no longer required contribute to a safer work area.

- Welding leads, hoses, and extension cords. If placed improperly they become tripping hazards. Please keep walkways free for passage and use walkovers to mitigate these hazards where possible.
- Where someone has taken the time to manage cords and hoses with cross over ramps, please use them. Avoid short cuts and stepping over hoses where it can be avoided. It generally takes only a few more steps whereas a momentary loss of focus or mis-step can result in injury.

Taking just five minutes at the beginning and end a shift to tidy up helps to reset workspaces to clean, orderly and safe spaces. Remember, good housekeeping is safe-keeping. Take a look around your work area before you start today. Is the level of housekeeping acceptable? Is a tool round up required? What other small adjustments will make this area safer?

Here are a few tips to help keep everyone safe:


- Traction aides as per conditions dictate.
