NATIONAL DAY OF MOURNING

#DayOfMourning

Marked annually in Canada on April 28, the National Day of Mourning is dedicated to remembering those who have lost their lives, suffered injury or illness on the job, or experienced a work-related tragedy.

The National Day of Mourning is not only a day to remember and honour those lives lost or injured due to a workplace tragedy, but also a day to collectively renew our commitment to improve health and safety in the workplace and prevent further injuries, illnesses and deaths.

Beyond the Statistics

According to the Association of Workers' Compensation Boards of Canada (AWCBC), in 2021, there were 1,081 workplace fatalities recorded in Canada, 1,009 of which were male workers, and 72 were female workers. Among these deaths were 18 young workers aged 15-24.

Add to these fatalities the 277,217 accepted claims (an increase of 23,820 from the previous year) for lost time due to a work-related injury or disease, including 34,548 from workers aged 15-24, and the fact that these statistics only include what is reported and accepted by the compensation boards, there is no doubt that the total number of workers impacted is even greater.

And it's not just these numbers on which we need to reflect. With each worker tragedy there are loved ones, family members, friends and co-workers who are directly affected, left behind, and deeply impacted – their lives also forever changed.

Scotford is not Immune

No one comes to work planning to be injured or lose their life. In fact, we all have reasons we want to go home safely.

Unfortunately, we have had close calls that could have been much worse.

- 18-Jul-20 Worker struck by zoom boom fork
- 28-Jul-20 Worker overcome by H2s Fell from ladder cage
- 30-Jul-20 Worker sandblasting, moved scaffolding back, mis stepped into hole
- 10-Sep-21 Worker pinched between channel head and handrail
- 28-Jan-22 Worker coming down scaffold stepped awkwardly injuring ankle
- 09-Feb-22 SO2 Exposures
- 22-Feb-22 Worker dismantling scaffold fell through hole
