STEP – HEALTH AND WELFARE

How does Health and Welfare relate to Safety?



You may not know this, but a Critical Behaviour (CB) was added to STEP over 2 years ago called Health and Welfare. As the world dealt with a pandemic, many Behaviour Based Safety Processes were adding a COVID specific CB.

As a STEP Steering Team, we felt that the way we manage our Health goes far beyond any one challenge. Hence the broader behaviour of Health and Welfare.

Some of the Safe & At-Risk Behaviours that may fit under this category are interactions that deal with:

- **Mental Health Challenges**
 - Stress
 - Depression
 - **Anxiety**
 - **Feelings of isolation**
 - Addiction
 - and More

- **Physical Health Challenges**
 - **Visible symptoms**
 - Changes in physical capabilities as someone recovers from an illness or injury
 - **Accessibility challenges**
 - and More

A Combination of any number of challenges. We are holistic beings

and stressors can/do affect many parts of us

and our lives.

These Interactions often start with Person A noticing Person B acting or interacting differently than they usually do. Then, because they care, Person A reaches out.

What's the worst that can happen? Person B says nothing is wrong and they leave knowing someone cared? Not a terrible outcome!

Reflection: Is there someone who is at risk due to Health/Welfare issues? Can I help them? Am I that person.

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FLY LIKE AN EAGLE, JUMP LIKE A LECLERC

When Patrick Leclerc was a little boy in St. Bruno, Quebec he had skates strapped to his feet. Speed skates with a long blade and a tiny boot. Eventually a barrel was put in front of him. He learned how to jump over it. "It is like a long step to start," said Patrick. And then another barrel was added. And another. At his World Champion peak, Patrick was clearing 16 16-inch barrels on ice - a distance of 27 feet. Patrick is no longer sailing over long lines of barrels and through burning screens at winter carnivals, but he does get to claim that he was the champion of the barrel-jumping world when he was competing. Not once but three times he held that crown. A combination of superior condition, with incredible control and daring is needed to attempt such a sport. Patrick and his younger brother Sylvain both grew into the sport naturally under the guidance and coaching of their father Gilles, a five-time barrel-jumping champion himself. "I once jumped over 17 barrels, but my right hand was behind me instead of in front of me straight out," recalls Patrick. "My hand brushed the last barrel. It didn't move, but the touch disqualified the jump." Patrick's success with the jumping of barrels led him to travel afar and it kept him busy. The competition itself flirted with the Olympics in its heyday but just fell shy of the number of countries needed to make it official. "I was that close to competing in the Olympics, I was the best in the world."
